V. Course Requirements: You will be expected to do a significant amount of writing, not only for assignments, but as well as in taking notes.. Students are expected to read ahead and are expected to attend all class sessions. Class participation in discussion is mandatory Substantive contributory discourse is essential.

VI. Methods of Evaluation: You will be evaluated upon the following- the assigned readings, participation, and examinations of how well you have processed the material and lectures. This will be done in the following manner:

- Two Quizzes worth 25 points each (or 2.5% of your grade),
- Two Short Papers worth 50 points each (or 5% of your grade),
- Four Long Papers worth 120 points each (or 12% of your grade),
- A Final Academic Essay worth 200 points (or 20% of your grade), and a
- Final Exam worth 150 points (or 15% of your grade).
- My subjective evaluation of your contributory participation makes up the remainder.

A detailed handout explaining assignments will be forthcoming.

VII. Grading Scale: You will be graded on the standard 100-point scale, conformed to Letter grades. I DO NOT CURVE GRADES. 'Curves' are a tool of the feeble-minded for rewarding the lurdane.
